PWPP Fall Gathering Date and Location To Be Announced

Highlights of the 2019 Fall Gathering

Despite a water main break which threw Bethel Park under a boil water advisory and a critical health emergency which knocked out a key organizer and implementer the day before the Fall Gathering, the intrepid Presbyterian Women of Bethel Presbyterian Church rallied and rose to the occasion, and the 31st PWPP Fall Gathering came off as scheduled. The theme, “Showers of Blessings and Love,” was based on 1 Peter 4:10, “As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God’s varied grace.”

The Reverend Deborah Smith of Liberty Presbyterian Church (near McKeesport), a former member of Bethel Church, led us in worship and delivered an inspiring message, “Stewardship of Spiritual Gifts.” Pastor Nancy Stanny of Oakdale United Presbyterian Church gave a spirited introduction to the 2019—2020 Horizons Bible Study, “Love Carved in Stone,” based on the Ten Commandments.

Mission Treasurer Pam Backstrom introduced the 2019 Thank Offering theme, “God Heeds Our Call,” based on Jeremiah 29:12-13. Pam highlighted a few of the 12 national and 6 international projects funded by the 2018 Thank Offering. Thank Offering contributions are gratefully received throughout the year, in recognition that thank offerings are taken at various times among our various congregations.

Two Mission Projects for 2019—2020 were presented. Emily Thornton explained that the mission of Foster Love is to provide love in action for foster children and to support the foster families who are caring for them. Specifically gift cards, in the amount of \$25, \$20, \$10, or \$5, are requested from Target, Walmart, Subway, Chick fil A, and Pizza Hut. Gift cards in total of \$200 were brought to the Gathering to kick-start the project and presented to Foster Love.

Knitted Knockers is a hands-on project for knitters and crocheters but monetary contributions are also welcome. Knitted Knockers are special handmade breast prostheses for women who have undergone mastectomies or other procedures to the breast. They are provided free to any woman who wants them. Pam Adomaitis and Mary Ellen Kirby (who provided a personal endorsement, having just undergone a mastectomy a few weeks earlier) introduced the project, which included detailed instructions provided by Carol MacDonald.

The main business of the Business Meeting was the approval of the 2020 Pledge of \$6,000 for Local Missions and the pledge of \$12,000 for International Missions.

The meeting was adjourned, grace and a prayer of thanksgiving for the saving of the day was said, and 51 attendees enjoyed a lunch prepared by the good PW sisters of Bethel Presbyterian Church.

Into the Light: Finding Hope through Prayers of Lament

In this nine-lesson study, Lynn Miller revives lament as a proper theological response to the difficult situations of our world. One of the foundational points of the study is that, in scripture, lament usually leads to hope. After crying out to God, the one who laments remembers God. And while that doesn't fix things in the moment—the injustice, the loss still exists—the lamenter is strengthened to face the world and to hope. And for us as Christians, hope is not just an emotional response or an attitude of pie in the sky. Hope implies movement: both God's inherent movement toward justice and our movement toward God. Recovering lament may be one of the church's most timely gifts to the world.

The Diaper Bank distribution is held on the 4th Saturday of the month from 9am – noon. Note: December 2020 distribution will be on the 3rd Saturday, Dec. 19th.

Our additional mission activities include making Little Dresses For Africa, hand knitted hats and scarves for Operation Safety Net, preemie knitted caps for Something Remembered Project, sweaters for Knit for Kids, and prayer shawls for anyone who wants one. We are blessed with a dedicated corps of proficient knitters, crocheters, sewers and crafters.

"Transitional Housing Program"

In 2020, the PW Synod of the Trinity Mission Project will help provide safe and reliable housing for homeless (or near homeless) women and their children through The Lighthouse Foundation's Transitional Housing Program. This program helps residents set achievable goals and provides support and resources to stabilize and improve their lives to ultimately obtain permanent housing. Residents may stay in transitional housing up to 18 months.

Educational programs include Faith & Finances, Jobs for Life, and parenting classes, all to help build a strong foundation for self-determination and self-sufficiency. The Transitional Housing program is exploring mental health programming to help residents who struggle with mental health or addiction issues.

While in the program, residents pay a monthly program fee, based on their ability to pay. The monthly fee enables residents to get accustomed to paying a bill regularly and on time. Half of each resident's program fees are set aside for a security deposit for permanent housing upon graduation.

It costs \$5,100 to house a family for 18 months in transitional housing. Two transitional housing sites focus specifically on young women and families with children. Residents are outfitted with basic necessities such as linens, housewares, clothing and toiletries.

The Lighthouse Foundation encourages others to find hope in Christ by meeting their immediate needs and empowering them towards self-sufficiency. Since 1985, the Lighthouse Foundation has served individuals and families in Northern Allegheny and Butler Counties. <https://www.thelighthousepa.org/>

Local Missions

PWPP distributed \$8,000 in 2019 in support of local missions, primarily those that support women and children, addressing the needs of health care, housing, food, education and emergency safe haven.

Lazarus Fund of Pittsburgh Presbytery—provides small grants (up to \$200) for rent or utilities.

South Hills Interfaith Ministries—provides services to low income families in the South Hills of Pittsburgh through food and clothing banks and assistance in learning to budget money and in applying for energy assistance.

The Open Door—is a youth outreach in Pittsburgh's West End neighborhood of Crafton Heights, a chronically underserved section of the City of Pittsburgh, providing Sunday evening youth group, monthly family dinners, summer camp, and a girls group for girls in grades four through eight.

Ventures in People—serves children in grades one through five from the neighborhood between 3:30 and 6:00 P.M. everyday the McKeesport schools are open, providing meals, snacks, homework help and once-a-week church time.

East Liberty Family Health Care Center—provides quality whole-person health care for all, including the uninsured, the underinsured, and the underserved, currently serving in East Liberty, Lincoln Lemington, the Hill District and Wilkinsburg.

HEARTH—provides a range of supportive services and housing that empowers homeless families who are survivors of domestic violence or other trauma to become independent, self-sufficient, and adequately housed.

Hot Metal Bridge Faith Community—provides free dinners every Tuesday and Thursday where all are invited, continental breakfast before worship each Sunday morning, and volunteers make and distribute sandwiches in the South Side neighborhood every Saturday.

Western Pennsylvania Diaper Bank—distributes diapers to families of low income or poverty level, currently in partnership with 32 agencies to collect and distribute diapers in five counties, including Allegheny. Also addressing the need for feminine hygiene products, working with partner agencies to collect and distribute.

Northside Christian Health Care— a community medical practice providing whole person spiritual and physical healthcare to all people who are in need of care, by providing patients with primary and preventive health care services to improve health and well-being.

North Hills Community Outreach— an organization of people helping people through life's many challenges, addressing the needs of people living in crisis, hardship and poverty.

PW of Third Presbyterian Church had a successful Fall Rummage Sale and made a donation to Gwen's Girls from the proceeds. The Holiday Bazaar was a well attended joyful kick-off to the season, featuring a trove of attic treasures, the return of Ro's delicious hot chicken salad and frozen cranberry delight, fine refurbished jewelry, books, Christmas items, needlecraft and favorite vendors. The 2019 Third Church Mouse, a well dressed, well coiffed music conductor, was a popular must-have for collectors and sold out early in the day. Our faithful and growing clientele from our surrounding communities look forward to the spring rummage sale coming up on May 9.

The ladies gathered again for an elegant Christmas brunch in the well decorated Shadyside Inn. Hannah Gideon prepared a delicious home made Indian dinner, which was thoroughly enjoyed by members of the congregation. The annual Spring Tea morphed into a Garden Party, preamble to a joint planting and weeding session with Repair The World, an interfaith mission partner. PW ladies and others participated in a hands-on knees-down effort to produce free fresh vegetables in a community garden.

Hands-on mission projects include making necklaces for Living Waters, providing Christmas surprise bags for group home members, contributing to the PWPP mission projects and supporting Days For Girls. The Pittsburgh Chapter of DfG, which is housed in Third Church, created, checked and double checked 7,851 kits in the recent international drive which totaled 46,221 DFG kits distributed to refugee and internally displaced women and girls.

The Chrismon Tree a Tradition at Union

For many years the women of **Union Presbyterian Church** have seen that an evergreen tree stood in the church during the advent season. A small Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia is credited with the origin of this traditional tree and symbols in 1957. The tree is an evergreen (we recently switched to an artificial tree) which symbolizes the eternal life which our savior has won for us.

Our tree is decorated with white and gold symbols which were hand made by the women of Union in the early 1970s. Most of the decorations are simple copies of symbols of Christianity from its earliest days and show God's never changing presence in our ever changing world.

The tiny white lights on the tree speak of Him who is the Light of the world. All the ornaments are white and gold with one exception a spot of red. This year we distributed a bulletin each week during advent which pointed out some of the symbols (ornaments) and explained their meaning. This yearly work of setting up the tree with its ornaments is truly a labor of love for our women.

East Liberty Presbyterian Church Celebrates Malawi Partnership

The partnership between Pittsburgh Presbytery and the Synod of Blantyre, Malawi, began in 1991. Since then, East Liberty Presbyterian Church has been a partner of Balaka CCAP (Church of Central Africa Presbyterian). More recently, the South Sudanese Presbyterian Evangelical Church joined Pittsburgh Presbytery and the Synod of Blantyre to form the International Partnership. Through the partnership, Presbyterian Women in East Liberty Presbyterian Church, including Kay Shissler and Peta Harrigan Cole, have visited Malawi. Our PW has helped the Women's Guild at Balaka CCAP build a rental house; the rent will support the activities of the Women's Guild.

When missionaries from the International Partnership visit Pittsburgh, we usually invite them for a meal. Sometimes, we study the Horizon's Bible Study lesson together, followed by lunch. Other times, we provide a summer brunch. Watch for details about the October 2020 visit from the mission delegation from Malawi and South Sudan.

The Reverend Shanea Leonard, Associate for Gender and Racial Justice, PCUSA, preached at ELPC on Sunday, February 16. We were pleased to gather a number of Presbyterian Women to have breakfast with Rev. Leonard at Ritter's Diner the day before.
