VOTING RIGHTS TAKEN AWAY! WHAT IS GOD CALLING US TO DO <u>NOW</u>?

New voter suppression laws became law in 24 of our 50 states in 2021-22, with even more being pushed right now across the country. This makes it very hard, at times impossible, to vote for many, especially African American, poor, Native American, and young adult citizens. This will radically skew future elections.

Pittsburgh Presbytery adopted on May 19, 2022, "Citizens' Right to Vote: A Call to Action," to be communicated to both churches and public officials to encourage actions to get and protect the right to vote. *With our Lord Jesus Christ's clear commandments to love others (and hence include their votes!)*, we urged in that Call that "Governments at every level need to make voting safe, secure, and easily accessible for all citizens. Congress can help by passing the John Lewis Voting Rights Act, the For the People Act, and the Freedom to Vote Act, or comparable legislation, and state legislatures must not be allowed to twist voting procedures for partisan advantage. We call upon our representatives at all levels of government to guarantee the fundamental right to vote for every eligible American."

SUGGESTED ACTIONS TO TAKE NOW:

Write your U.S. Senators, Representative, and the President and Vice-President, urging national voting rights legislation be passed immediately, such as the 2022 John Lewis Voting Rights Act, the For the People Act, the Freedom to Vote Act, or comparable legislation. (See Resource list for more info.)

Help people get registered to vote – and to get to the polls to vote, if need be. Churches can host nonpartisan **Voter Registration Days** and publicize those in their local regions. (See Resources below.)

Encourage people to **learn where all candidates stand** on Voting Rights, how they have voted in the past and what they say they will do now if elected, and use your vote to urge Voting Rights.
