

# **Biographical Statement**

I was born in Fort Wayne, Indiana, in 1986, and raised there, excepting the year 1996, when my family lived in Bangkok, Thailand. My family and I were active members of Beacon Heights Church of the Brethren. I became a member of a PC(USA) congregation in Jackson, Mississippi in 2009, after I completed a degree in religion and political science from the University of Chicago. I attribute this denominational transition to my introduction and subsequent profound admiration for the work of John Calvin. I lived for a summer in a peace and reconciliation community in Northern Ireland in 2013. In 2014, I attained my Master of Divinity degree from Harvard Divinity School. That same year I relocated to Pittsburgh, to serve as the Chaplain and Instructor of Religion at The Neighborhood Academy. In



2017 I moved to Los Angeles and served as Director of Youth Ministry at Westwood Presbyterian Church. In 2018 I made a tour in India, where I ate considerable quantities of thali. I returned to Pittsburgh in 2019, and abided the nadir of the pandemic while serving as Executive Director of The Open Door Youth Outreach program. Otherwise, I have been a classroom teacher, in grades from kindergarten to 12th, since 2009. Subject areas I taught include World Religions, the Bible as Literature, research seminars on Kant and John Rawls, the history of the Black Church, and American literature. I have an enduring adoration for the philosophical hermeneutics of Paul Ricoeur. The mysteries of faith and God I have contemplated from the age of thirteen, upon first discovering Kierkegaard. In ministry, I strive to faithfully and honorably preach and teach the Gospel, and to do so with joy. I am a bachelor. I should like to learn to play piano. Among gospels my favorite is Mark, among writers, Chekhov, to whom I owe the inspiration for both the content and spirit of this biographical sketch.

### **Current Sense of Call**

As should be evident from my biography, my vocational discernment process has been intimately connected to my love for theology and philosophy of religion. Admittedly, when I began my serious study of the intellectual traditions of Christian faith, I primarily had an academic career in mind, since it seemed clear to me that God had provided me with skills and inclinations best suited for the academy. This changed, rather suddenly, when I began my first field education placement, working as a seminarian for the university's campus ministry. When I approached the pulpit for the first time, I felt a leap

in my chest, and a deep sense of the intimate, sacred responsibility that is so integral to faithful preaching and teaching. For perhaps the first time in my life, and despite my very real anxiety and inexperience, I was confident that God had provided me with a genuine glimmer of what would most sustain my spirit and serve God's creation. Of course, a glimmer is just that. What I felt was undeniably profound, but I had yet to integrate it into a faith practice and spiritual discipline that could sustain it beyond the temporary. Since that day, over a decade ago, my journey with God has been a continual process of prayer, conversation, professional development, and rigorous self-analysis. My career has provided me with ample lessons in all of these areas, some considerably more difficult than others. It has been a journey of growth and also of loss, as I have had to learn how to navigate God's claim on my life while still remaining true to who God created me to be. Through experiences and relationships too numerous to list here, I am confident that God has brought me on this journey for such a time and such a place as this. I pray that God will continue to guide and sustain me as I continue to grow into this sacred calling.

I put my trust in the Triune God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. I believe that God is One, and that the One God exists always in relational unity, in the loving embrace of all-encompassing. divine union.

I believe in God, whom Jesus called Abba, Father. I believe that God spoke into creation all that is, seen and unseen. I believe that God's creation is good, and that God created human beings in God's image. I believe that God gave God's human creation a position of special dominion and special responsibility among all creation.

I believe in Jesus Christ, the only begotten Son of God—begotten, not made. I believe that, as the Son of God, Jesus was with God and was God from the beginning of all creation. I believe that Jesus is the Logos, the Word of God expressed in cosmic and human form, and through Him all things were created. I believe that Jesus was born of Mary through the conception of God's Spirit, and that in taking on flesh was both truly human and truly God. I believe that Jesus grew into adulthood while witnessing and experiencing the dislocation and loss of exile and the brutality of state violence. I believe that, upon entering his adult ministry, Jesus proclaimed Good News to the poor and oppressed, called for the repentance of sins, healed the sick, comforted the brokenhearted, and lived among the marginalized and despised. I believe that Jesus was unjustly tried and condemned by the forces of Empire, tortured, crucified, and killed by the State. I believe that in this, Jesus experienced the depth of human suffering, as the One who is with us even in the most forsaken places and experiences. I believe that Jesus was raised from the dead by God, and that in His death and resurrection, Jesus delivered us from the power of sin, death, and despair. I believe that, after appearing before and comforting His friends, Jesus ascended into Heaven, and is with God, whom He called Father.

I believe in the Holy Spirit. I believe that the Spirit animates and guides all of creation. I believe that the Spirit gathers together humans from all walks of life into the Church, which is the Body of Christ. I believe that the Spirit comforts us, encourages us, and guides us, everywhere breathing life and renewal into us.

I believe that God created human beings in God's image. I believe that all people are made equally in this image, and that God's love extends to us all as one human community. Despite this, I believe that humans turn from God, rebel against God's love, and choose to violate God's laws. We elect to do evil through sin, turning away from the loving relationality of God. I believe that the sins that we commit, through action or inaction, cascade from our individual lives into systems of oppression and evil. I believe that for our sins, we incur guilt as transgressors of God's all-encompassing care and love.

Nevertheless, I believe that God chose, out of unfathomable grace, to be with us and for us. I believe that we are found holy and worthy of God's love, not through our own merit or action, but through the incomprehensible depth and breadth of God's grace. I believe that God has gathered us into the Body of Christ, the holy and universal catholic Church, that we might live into the reality of such grace and witness it to those whom we encounter. I believe that the Church unites us in physical and spiritual communion with God., through the sacraments instituted by Jesus of Baptism and the Lord's Supper. I believe that in Baptism we are joined to the Body of Christ in the name of the Triune God, and that in the Eucharist we are lifted into union with God's Spirit.

#### Statement of Faith—Michael Ball

I believe that the Church teaches us, supports us, and gives us both a foretaste of and model for the loving community that is the Kingdom of God. I believe that God provided the Scriptures for the Church, through which the Church discerns its gospel message, purpose, and inspiration. I believe that the Scriptures are the first, foremost, and essential means by which God's message of love is given to us. I believe that the Church is called to carry this message to all people, to invite people to the call of discipleship through acts of Christian love, to celebrate the sacraments, and to teach in keeping with Christ's commandment to love God and love our neighbor as ourselves.

I believe that, at the end of this age, God will gather up all that belongs to God, and in doing so reconcile to Godself all of creation. I believe that Jesus will come again, and that every knee that is in heaven and on earth and below the earth will bend at His name. I believe that those whom God has gathered to Godself will be raised, and that the world to come will see the full flourishing of the Kingdom of God.

# **Biographical Statement**

I grew up on the Northside of Pittsburgh, and currently reside in its Brighton Heights section. Throughout my life, I have attended Bidwell Church. Once I became a teenager, my church attendance was infrequent. My formal education was within the Pittsburgh Public Schools. In twelfth grade English class the person next to me said, "You need to do your work!" "This class is so interesting, how is it you can just sit there writing rhymes and not work?"



I exclaimed, "It is the same content, isn't it!" Who would have thought that the girl trying to encourage me to complete classwork would become my wife? This August, Patrice and I celebrated sixteen years of marriage.

After graduation from Perry Traditional Academy, I went to the University of Pittsburgh. I received a bachelor's degree in history and a master's degree in teaching. Upon completion of graduate school, I received a position from the Pittsburgh Public Schools at Frick International Studies Academy (as a Social Studies teacher). Once I started teaching, I had a new goal. I wanted to be a principal within an urban setting. After some years I was accepted to Indiana University of Pennsylvania to work dually on principal certification and the doctoral program of education. It was at this time that God called me to become a pastor and I withdrew from IUP and started at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary.

The Reverend James Cleveland said in his song, It's a Good Day, "There's going to be some ups and some downs, smiles and some frowns, but it's been a good day." This song is similar to life. Like everyone I have experienced both good times, as well as bad, but I know that God is with me every step of the way, therefore it is a good day.

### **Current Sense of Call**

It was at the time when I was accepted in the IUP program for principal and superintendent certification, where I felt God calling me to become a pastor. With this strong inclination, I immediately withdrew from the program at IUP and enrolled at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary.

At the time, I was in my fifth year of teaching and the Middle School Coordinator at The Pittsburgh Project. I believed that I could finish my career as a teacher and become a pastor after retirement. I had a Sunday School teacher named Mr. Bryant. He taught Men's Sunday School into his nineties. He would often say, "If you want to hear God laugh, tell God your plans!"

It took me almost twenty years to finish my work at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. The reasoning is twofold. First, I had a work schedule as a teacher and a coordinator of fifty-five hours minimum per week. Secondly, after a bout of Bell's Palsy, I took a few years off from taking classes.

Now I find myself twenty-one years after that initial call from God. My Seminary course work completed, with God also moving me from inquirer to a candidate potentially ready to hear a call. The same neurological and immune deficiency that caused me to have Bell's Palsy in my thirties, has caused long term adverse aftereffects from Covid 19 infections. The side effects resulted in my retirement after twenty-six years of teaching.

Rather than confidently transitioning into God's call on my life, I am simply holding on to my call from God. It is my sense of call from God that has evolved into a revered promise. Any boldness, confidence, or self-efficacy that I possess is from the Lord. Therefore, while considering that call, I am prayerfully waiting for the next steps.

2 Statement of Faith (Reasons for Thanksgiving, Loving God, and One Another).
